# Cookin' with

### **CARAMEL PUDDING**

Put <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> cup of light brown sugar in a round cake tin, cover with pieces of butter the size of 5 cent coins, then layers of sliced cooking apples.

Cream 2 ounces butter and 2 ounces brown sugar together, add 2 well-beaten eggs, then add 1 cup of flour, 1 cup of bran, and 1 teaspoon of baking powder; also pinch of salt. Spread this mixture on top of apples and bake in a mooderate oven for 1½ hours. Turn out on plate and serve with cream.

#### **GOLDEN APPLE PUDDING**

Peel and core the necessary number of medium sized apples. Make a pastry, roll out thin, and cut pieces large enough to entirely cover each apple.

Into a piedish put 3 tablespoons of golden syrup and 1 cup of boiling water. Place covered apples in this syrup and bake in oven. Baste the apples with the syrup 2 or 3 times while they are baking. They will have a lovely golden colour when cooked.


### Hide Safari on your iPad — iOS 12

The steps needed are to access Settings > Screen Time >Content and Privacy Restrictions





#### Slide Safari to OFF




The Safari app will no longer be visible on the iPad.

NOTE: With Safari 'hidden' on your iPad you may no longer be able to locate any URLs Airdropped to you.









### **Canning Stock Route experience in Australia**

A cloudy sky and a light breeze, gave a slightly cooler, more comfortable day for our first social meeting of the year. Around forty members including some new folk sat down to chat and enjoy a hearty meal before adjourning to the hall for a New Year welcome from our President and a brief business session. Jillian Wilson then gave us a screen show and a captivating talk on her latest Australian desert trip.

Jillian set out last June, this time with the Diamantina Touring Company in a group of 6 trucks, 24 people, and a "tag-a-long vehicle" to travel 1800kms or more on a 3 week round trip from Alice Springs along the very remote Canning Stock Route in the Great Sandy Desert, an arid wasteland in North Western Australia. It is one of the toughest and most remote tracks in the world. From Alice Springs it passes through the Tanami Desert, and the Simpson Desert. Jillian told us a little of the history of the route. Gold was first found in Wiluna in 1896 and in 1906 a stock route was completed to drove stock in to provide food for gold diggers. To water the cattle along the way 52 wells were dug out around 25km apart. In the Northern Territory the route passes through land owned by the Aboriginal Warlpiri people (where photography is forbidden) & in Western Australia it passes through pastoral land where cattle stations were established.

Jillian told us that private vehicles/groups, must have a permit to use the Canning Stock Route. On the long unsealed rough, very uneven, up & down, often deeply trenched red soil dust road they met a lot of commercial "road trains" and passed many broken down wrecked old vehicles left on the wayside. There are also many feral cats in the desert! However, the sheer remoteness, the wildness, the desert plants & trees made it a beautiful scenic trip. Great heat during the day, extra cold at night. Jillian's photography showing the contrast between a rich variety of bird & animal life, insects, Aboriginal paintings inside caves, evening light over Lake Disappointment and wrecks, waste, sheer desert "nothingness" left us all spellbound.

### 26 March 2019 Knuts about Knitting Knots

Elizabeth Chesney has been interested in mathematical puzzles all her life and has endeavoured to pass on her enthusiasm for the subject to anyone willing to listen, learn and 'give it a go'. She is currently doing a maths degree at Canterbury University and one summer she did a research project that linked mathematics with crafts by knitting and studying knots. This talk is the result of that research.

Knots have been used for thousands of years, with the earliest examples found dating back to prehistoric times. Besides their obvious function of tying objects together, they have been used for everything from recording information, to decoration and spiritual symbolism. Mathematicians are interested in knots for other reasons and study properties of knots related to their geometry in an area of mathematics known as knot theory. In this talk we'll reveal some of the beauty and complexity of this subject using some simple knitted knots. We'll see that while knitting is not knotting, we can certainly knit our way into knot theory!





William and Charlotte Brouwer

William was born in 1931 in the city of Hen Haug (known in English as the Haajun), in Holland a country of 17 million people. At the age of 8 years he and his family faced the Nazi invasion of their country. It took only three days for the Germans to take complete control of the country. All the eligible men were either conscripted for the German war effort, worked for the Germans or were jailed. It was worse for the jews and gypsies - they were sent away in trains never to be seen again.

Life was tough during the War: No power, water, heating or food. Cats and dogs were a choice meat if you could find them. His parents like many other parents relied on the children especially the boys to seek and find any scraps they could find to help the family survive. It is hard to imagine groups of boys fighting over one large potato that fell off a truck. Their family accommodation was on the top storey of a three story block. From 1943 onwards they started to strip all unnecessary wood off the house for fuel to keep warm. The Germans at the same time were stripping copper and lead from all the buildings in Holland for the Nazi war effort.

After the war, William worked in the fur industry and spent 15 years attending a furrier school were he graduated as a Master Furrier. He specialised in mink furs.

During the Muldoon era, there was heavy unemployment in Holland and it was in 1978 when William made up his mind to marry Charlotte, his sweet heart who was about to immigrate to New Zealand. There was tremendous incentive to do so. Canada, Australia, New Zealand were granting Free passage to their countries for families. Also 200 Gilders per family to do so. William actually married Charlotte on the day before their departure to New Zealand, so it is fair to say, the Voyage to New Zealand was their Honeymoon.

After arriving in New Zealand, they both were trading through the markets.

In 1990 they bought a steep section in the suburb of Mount Pleasant, Christchurch and William built his own wooden three storey house. It is built of solid timber and has beautiful views of the Pacific Ocean looking over South Brighton.

William and Charlotte have been Seniornet Mac members since 2014

The following notes have been blatantly copied from a slide presentation on 24th June 2015 by Grant Sidaway, CEO of the Federation of SeniorNet Society of New Zealand.

### The Main Players

- Advertisers
- Publishers
- Aggregators
- Two Instigators
  - Your IP address—how you are able to communicate
    49.224.120.95
    - Find your IP address http://whatsmyipaddress. com/
  - Cookies
    - Small pieces of data sent from a website and stored in a user's web browser
    - They can't carry viruses or install malware
    - Tracking cookies compile records of browsing histories

### What happens when we die?

- 29,500 people die in NZ each year
- As at 2012; 30 million Facebook users had already died
- Executors dispose of assets by way of a Will
- No rules around digital property
- Does your Will state what you want done with digital property?
- Currently flout the law give username and passwords co-executors?
- "The right to be forgotten" to have information removed
- Do you own it or do the internet platforms? Google, Facebook etc

### Can I remove information about me?

- Check yourself out search your name in Google https://www.google.com/settings/dashboard
- Removing yourself from Goodle
  - fill out the form that Google provides here https://support.google.com/wesearch/ answer/2744324

- Remember if the offensive information is on a website that is not Google. It may still be available on a source website
- Delete obsolete accounts
- Check privacy settings on account
- Ask Webmasters to remove information about you

#### Your Facebook Account - after you die

#### Memorialized Accounts

- A place for friends and family to gather and share memories after a person has passed away.
   Memorialized Accounts have the following features:
- The word remembering will be shown next to the person's name on their profile.
- Depending on the privacy settings of the account, friends can share memories on the *Memorialized Timeline*
- Content the person shared (ex: photos, posts) stays on Facebook and is visible to the audience it was shared with
- *Memorialized profiles* don't appear in public spaces such as in suggestions for *People You May Know*, ads or birthday reminders
- No one can log into a *memorialised account*
- *Memorialized accounts* don't have a legacy contact can't be changed

#### Request to remove account

- Family members can ask to remove their loved one's account from Facebook. You must send a request form.
- Your request must include one of the following:
  - Death Certificate
  - Court document confirming power of attorney
  - Birth Certificate
  - · Last will and testament

### Deactivate

- Deactivate
- Flexibility to leave and come back whenever you want
- The following will occur:
  - People won't be able to see the information on your Timeline on Facebook.
  - People on Facebook will not be able to search for you.
  - Some information, like messages will be saved (ex: friends, photos, interests), just in case you want to come back to Facebook at some point.
