

Cookin with

SPICED BROWN SUGAR APPLE CAKE

200g of butter, softened.

200g of soft brown sugar.

200g of self-raising flour.

 $1^{1}/_{2}$ tsp ground mixed spice.

4 free-range eggs, large and beaten.

4 apples, (small eating apples), such as Cox's Orange Pippins, cored and diced (skin on).

1 apple, (large eating apple), cored and cut into wedges.

Demerara sugar, for sprinkling over the top.

Preheat the oven to 180°C/gas mark 4 and liberally butter and line a 7 inch (18cm) round cake tin. Mix the ground mixed spice with the flour.

Place all of the ingredients, except the apple, into a large bowl or food mixer and beat together for 2-3 minutes until well mixed and amalgamated. Add the 4 diced apples and stir into mix.

Spoon the cake mixture into the prepared tin and arrange the sliced apples over the top before sprinkling some Demerara sugar over the top of the cake and apples.

Bake in the oven for 55–60 minutes, or until a skewer inserted in the middle of the cake comes out clean.

Allow the cake to cool in the tin for a few minutes before turning out on to a wire rack; allow to cool completely before slicing and serving.




iOS 16. iPadOS 16

Conversions


This article is a series of experiments I carried out on an iPhone when iOS 16 became available and then on my iPad with iPadOS 16.

The first 3 images show what happened when I held my finger on '245 ¥' and then on '45 mph' typed in the Notes app.













245 ¥ was shown as 2.58 Australian dollars and 45 mph was shown as 72.42 kilometres per hour and also 20.12 metres Per Second.

Then I tried on the iPad and typed '24 lb', '8 stone' and '100 kg'.

45 mph 245¥

24 lb 8 stone 100 kg

The above screenshot shows that Notes has underlined 4 of the 5 items. It does not appear to recognise '8 stone'.

I tried everything I could think of but could not encourage Notes to do anything with 8 stone.

But I did find something else of interest. If I pressed and held my finger on '100 kg' I was shown the conversion to 'pounds', 'grams', 'kilograms' and 'metric tons'.




On the other hand, if I just tapped on '100 kg' I was no longer offered the conversion to 'pounds'.



I then became aware of the 'copy to clipboard' icon beside each of the suggested conversions. Tapping that allowed me to paste the suggested conversion into the Notes document.

I'm still not sure how I will make use of what I have found but as I need to fill the rest of this page in *AUSOM News* I tried typing 45°.





Did you notice the icons beside Celsius and Fahrenheit? A tiny thermometer. Yes but I assumed the icon beside Celsius is showing that 45°C would be HOT and the one beside Fahrenheit is suggesting 45°F would be colder.

Perhaps you have some other ideas or have tried other more useful conversions.

Sigh! There is still some space to fill...



I typed something about the weather into Messages. By looking for the tiny underline it appears I need to enter the word 'degrees' as the abbreviation 'deg' does not seem to be understood. Space filled so I leave it to you to try Mail and other apps.

iPadOS 16

New display setting

If you have an 11" iPad Pro you might find this new feature in iPadOS 16 useful—you can now change the resolution to show as much content on screen as a larger sized iPad Pro! Particularly useful for Stage Manager. Try it by visiting Settings > Display and Brightness. After the iPad restarts you will see more content in the Settingsapp than there was before —more options on the sidebar, and the text is smaller.



iOS

Reachability

This is not a new feature but one that you might find useful if you have recently purchased an iPhone that is a little larger than your previous phone. Perhaps you would like to be able to do more while holding your phone in one hand.

Modern versions of iOS have made the back icon available at the foot of the screen. However, Photos still displays it at the top-left.






Accessing the back icon in Photos while holding the phone in one hand is possible using Reachability.

Go to Settings > Accessibility > Touch, then turn on Reachability. Once you have done that, you can lower the top half of the screen, as shown in the image.

To achieve this on an iPhone with Face ID: Swipe down on the bottom edge of the screen. (I find that if I swipe down on the black bar, I achieve the result I want each time).

On an iPhone with a Home button: Lightly doubletap the Home button.



The screen will return to its original state after giving you a few seconds to tap the back or other icons.

iOS or iPadOS

Taking photos — tip

For the best camera angle, we are often advised to get down low. How do you manage if you are photographing young children, babies and small animals? When we were young, it was not too difficult to kneel or even lie on the ground to angle the shot perfectly.

Your iPhone or iPad CAN help.

There are ways to bring the camera lens closer to the ground without bending your knees. Turn your iPhone or iPad upside down. Don't worry—the photo will not be upside down. It might be possible to put your iPhone or iPad on a chair or low table.

Take advantage of a timed shot, live photo, burst mode or another way of capturing the photo.



General Interest

Apple ID and iCloud

As you use your iPhone, iPad or Mac, there will be many times when you may be prompted to sign into either an Apple ID or iCloud account to enable certain functionality or to use certain features. You are not required to have an Apple ID or iCloud account just to use your iPhone, iPad or Mac. They are optional. So if you don't want to set up these accounts, you always have the option to skip them.

However, you do need one of these accounts to use some applications and some optional services.

Apple ID

The Apple ID is a simple registration for one person. It's a way of getting you and your information into Apple's database so that you can identify yourself on your computer, and Apple's online services. With an Apple ID, you have an email address and a password that you'll need to sign in with. In addition to your name and contact information, the Apple ID can keep a record of Apple devices that you own. But probably the most common reason people use an Apple ID is that that's where you set up your payment information to use any of Apple's online stores. So if you buy apps on the app store or music through the Apple Music Service, or books through Apple Books, you'll need an Apple ID with a credit card or a gift card link to it so you can make those purchases.

iCloud account

An iCloud account gives you access to storing information online or accessing certain data on multiple devices. For example, iCloud allows you to keep your address book, calendars, reminders and notes synchronised on multiple devices. So the information on your iPhone calendar will be the same as the calendar information on your iPad or your Mac. It also lets you synchronise data from other applications like your photo library. iCloud also includes an email account. A cloud storage tool. And a backup solution for your iPhone or iPad.





A basic iCloud account is free, but some optional services cost money.

You can create multiple Apple IDs, but it's best to stick with one account. If you want all of your Apple services to work properly and your devices to sync, you need to make sure to use the same Apple ID everywhere you sign in.

Important

Please remember the email address you use to log in to your Apple ID and the password. If for no other reason, you will need this information to locate a lost or stolen device with Find My.

iOS or iPadOS

OR Codes

QR codes give quick access to websites. There is no need to type or remember a web address. They are commonly used to share links to websites, contact information, or to make payments.

Open the Camera app, and hold your iPhone or iPad so that the QR code appears in the viewfinder in the Camera app. Once the QR code has been recognised, in most cases, a URL will appear on the screen.



Warning: If the URL or other words displayed do not 'sound right' then DON'T tap to follow that link.

At a recent meeting of AUSOM's Creativity SIG, we looked at the Shortcut 'Make QR Code' on an iPad.



As seen above, we found a selection of uses for a QR code. There are many others.

Ensure you know what you expect the QR code to do for you before you tap the notification.

MacOS/iOS

Freeform

About 4 weeks ago Apple launched Freeform and described it as a powerful new app designed for creative brainstorming and collaboration.

Freeform is available for iPhone, iPad, and Mac and requires the latest versions of the operating systems.

If you have not yet had a look at Freeform, a good place to start would be with any of the many videos available on YouTube. Some of the features of Freeform you might like to explore are:

- All boards you create have an Infinite Canvas.
- Zoom in or out to view obtects.
- Text and Sticky Notes: Options for adding and styling text on your Boards are 3D Sticky Notes or creating and editing Text Boxes.
- Shapes and Shape Styles. The shapes will be familiar to those who use Pages, Numbers or Keynote.
- Photos, Videos and Masking. Insert photos or videos and use other shapes from the Shape Library to mask your photos.
- Lines and Connecting Objects: Lines can be customised to make them thicker, thinner, dotted, dashed, straight, curved, arrow-headed, etc. These connecting lines can dynamically move and adapt as you change or move the content on your Freeform Board.
- Website and Rich Media Attachments: It is possible to embed content from other apps and locations—a website URL, a spreadsheet from Numbers, a location from Maps, etc.
- Drawing and Annotating: This is possible using an Apple Pencil (iPad) or your finger (iPad/iPhone).
- Collaboration: Working simultaneously on the same Board at the same time means you can rapidly design your next big project.
- Exporting as a PDF: Export your Board as a PDF document (either with or without the dotted background) for sharing with those who do not use macOS or iOS.
- Duplicate boards to create your own set of templates.



iPadOS

Tips App

The Tips app on your iPad contains information that helps you obtain more from your iPad. The tips are collected together and new tips are added frequently.


The next image shows the view I obtained when I first opened the Tips app.







Tap the icon near the top-left (circled above) to see the 'collections' originally available.



This is one of the easiest ways of locating the iPad User Guide. Tap the area circled above.



The current User Guide will be displayed with a comprehensive Table of Contents.



While you are exploring any of the areas of interest, tapping the icon shown to the left of the word Help (above) will take you back to the Table of Contents. Tapping Done will close the User Guide and allow you to select another topic from Collections.



The image above shows how most of the tips are composed of a clear image with a short text explanation.

If you find a tip you would like to keep/save for easy reference, tap the bookmark icon near the top-right.



After you have bookmarked a Tip, the Collections list will include a new topic—*Your Tips*.



To remove a tip from Your Tips, tap to open the Tip and then tap the bookmark icon.

Example: Timely Tip

The tip below is located within the Camera Collection to assist those who need to use their camera in a hurry.







When new tips are added...

You may find it useful to be notified when new tips are added. If so:

- Go to Settings > Notifications,
- Scroll down and Tap Tips below Notification Style,
- Slide Allow Notifications to ON.
- Choose options for the location and style of tip notifications and when they should appear.

MacOS/iOS

Autocorrect

Autocorrect seems to be always around sometimes helping us but also responsible for countless miscommunications.

When the keyboard on iPhones was tiny autocorrect helped us type faster and more accurately.

The good news is that the predictive algorithms behind autocorrect are getting smarter, as the software learns more about us (both individually and collectively) and about what we like to type.

If autocorrect isn't doing what you want it to, or you want to make it better or turn it off altogether, these are the settings and the screens you need to know about.

iOS

If you head to Settings in iOS and then tap on General and Keyboard, you can toggle both Auto-Correction and Predictive on or off. Misspellings will still be highlighted (unless you also disable Check Spelling on the same screen)—if you tap on a misspelled word underlined in red, you'll still be able to access suggested replacements, though they won't be automatically applied as they are when autocorrect is turned on.

There's also a text replacement feature in iOS that you can access by tapping General, Keyboard, and Text Replacement from Settings. This can be used as a kind of autocorrect replacement: Type the phrase you want the keyboard to spell out at the top, and the phrase you want to type to trigger it underneath. For example, "on my way" could be the phrase and "omw" could be the shortcut.

To ensure that a word you type will not be changed by autocorrect type the word and leave the shortcut box blank (this will result in your word appearing in the shortcut box).

macOS

Autocorrect and Text Replacement are also adjusted at the system level on a Mac. The procedure is very similar to that used for iOS.

Be aware that many apps on your Mac allow you to adjust the checking of spelling and grammar. If the app you are using isn't doing what you want look under Edit > Spelling and Grammar.

Text Replacement

Text Replacement will 'sync' between your Apple devices. For my personal 'shortcuts' I use %2 or %pd. Many of you will not be surprised to know that on my computer %atb followed by a space produces All the best, Pam.

iPad0S

Markup Tools iPad

Have you found new Markup tools in the Notes app? They are a little hard to find and at this stage I cannot find them in any other iPad apps.

With the Markup tools showing, swipe left as shown by the arrow in the next image.



If you are using the Notes app, 3 new tools will appear to the right of the Rule.



The first is a marker that adjusts to pressure applied as you draw with it.

The second is a calligraphy pen. I had fun using this new pen to draw shapes such as a star.

The third is a water colour marker.



iPadOS

iPad Quick Tip

You do not always need to open an app before you can locate your most recently used items. Some iPad apps allow you to select a document from the icon representing the app on the Home Screen.

Hold your finger on the icon briefly and a small window will show thumbnails of the last 4 documents. Tap the one you want to open it in the app.









HOW2 Transfer data from your old iPad to your new iPad

Use Automatic Setup to transfer data to new iPad

In iOS 11 and later, you can use any old device to set up a new iPad by transferring your old device's settings to your new device when in close physical proximity.

- Select your language on your new iPad with your new and old devices in close proximity.
- Tap Continue on your iPad on the pop up that appears asking you to set up your new iPad with your Apple ID.




- Use your old iPad to scan the image that appears on your new iPad.
- Enter your old iPad's passcode on your new iPad.
- Set up Touch ID or Face ID on your new iPad.











- Choose whether or not to restore your new iPad from your most recent compatible backup, if that option presents itself.
- Choose to restore your new device from an iCloud or iTunes backup, set up as a new iPad, or transfer data from an Android device.









- Tap Continue under Express Settings to use Siri's settings, Find My iPhone, Location, and usage analytics that were transferred over from your old iPad.
- Agree to the terms and conditions.



Complete the setup process for your new iPad as you normally would.

Use a Mac to transfer data to new iPad

With macOS Catalina and later, there is no longer an iTunes app. Instead, iTunes is split up into three new, standalone apps: Music, TV, and Podcasts. None of those apps handle backing up, updating, or restoring iPhones and iPads anymore on the Mac. For those tasks, you need to turn to the Finder. Of course, if you are still on macOS Mojave or earlier, the steps below are the same, except you'll use iTunes instead of the Finder.

- Connect your old iPad to your Mac.
- Click Finder in the Dock to open a new Finder window.
- Click on your iPad in the sidebar.











- Click the checkbox next to Encrypt local backup if you want to encrypt this backup.
- Enter a password if you chose to encrypt your backups.





Click Back Up Now and wait for the backup to complete, then disconnect your old iPad.














- Connect your new iPad to the same Mac that you used to back up the old one.
- Click your new iPad in the sidebar.
- Click the button next to Restore from this backup.





- Click on a backup from the drop-down.
- Click Continue.





Follow the instructions on your new iPad to finish setting it up.

Use iCloud to transfer data to new iPad

If you use iCloud to back up your iPad, you can transfer everything to your new iPad wirelessly. However, before you do that, you'll want to trigger one last manual backup on your old iPad to make sure you get everything as up-to-date as possible on your new device.

- Open Settings on your old iPad.
- Tap the Apple ID banner.
- Tap iCloud.










- Tap iCloud Backup.
- Tap Back Up Now.



After you back up your iPad, you'll want to get started with your new iPad and restore the older device's back up to it.


- Press the Home button on your new iPad to start the setup process.
- Follow the instructions for initial setup. If you're looking to transfer everything from your old iPad to your new iPad, try using the <u>Automatic Setup</u> process in iOS 11.
- Tap Restore from date of most recent backup Backup to restore your latest iCloud backup when you're using Automatic Setup.
- Tap Agree.







Finish setting up your new iPad with Siri, location, app analytics, and Apple Pay settings.



Your iPad will now restore from your iCloud backup. This could take some time.
