This month our Speaker will be Ken Livingston, Masters in Antarctic Studies.

Topic: "20 Aspects of Antarctica"

A rough overview of different facets of Antarctica.



Ken says: I went to Antarctica as a tourist in 2000 and have been passionate about the place ever since - all aspects - the geographic, history, marine mammals, the ocean around it and everything else. That led me to the Antarctic Society, and I was the Auckland branch co-chair until I moved to Christchurch (and found I was on the Christchurch branch committee before I'd arrived).

I took a 3 month sabbatical from work to do the Postgraduate Certificate in Antarctic Studies (PCAS) with my wife at the beginning of last year. The PCAS covers a wide range of Antarctic topics (hence the '20 Aspects' presentation) and forms the basis for a Masters in Antarctic Studies, which my wife completed last year.

We took an Antarctic Film Festival on tour around the South Island, through the winter, which was great fun and a bit of hard work, but brought Antarctica to around 1,000 people, and planning is under way to take it to the North Island.
